The college has immense potential in multidisciplinary/ interdisciplinary approaches in education since many languages like English, Malayalam, Sanskrit and Arabic and disciplines like Economics, History, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics, Political Science, Journalism etc. are offered here.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

As a student-centric initiative, the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) offers a learning-friendly approach that can ensure a multi-disciplinary holistic education. The college has been motivating its student community to join for such credit programmes from foreign universities. The possibilities embedded in Coursera have already been communicated to the students. Kannur University is yet to start discussions with other national/ foreign universities. It is aimed at creating a national level facility to provide flexibility of curriculum frame work and interdisciplinary or multidisciplinary academic mobility of students across higher education institutions with appropriate credit transfer mechanisms to earn a degree or diploma. It is an online virtual space provided to students to deposit and accumulate the credits they earn during their programmes.

The students can join any of these initiatives of their requirement during their tenure. ASAP provides them means of earning while learning, and in YIP, mentorship is key process where candidates receive much support and guidance from their assigned mentors. Integrating Hindi, Sanskrit, and Arabic into the curriculum helps preserve the cultural heritage and equips students with linguistic skills, cultural understanding, and potential career opportunities that span across national and international boundaries. Embracing regional languages in education fosters inclusivity and empowers individuals from various linguistic backgrounds. Learning in one's mother tongue fosters better comprehension, critical thinking, and overall cognitive development.. The Malayalam department organised various programmes in a week long celebration " Bharna Bhasha- Mathrubhasha" emphasising the need of promotion of the mother tongue, Malayalam. This was done through interaction with a prominent writer(Dr.Jissa Jose), Vayalar memorial talks by eminent personalities(Dr. Purshothaman T.V..and Dr. Padmanabhan Kavumbhai), poem composing, essay and quiz competitions and a semi-classical dance performance.

In the college, different levels of outcome based education are designed like programme outcomes (PO), programme specific outcomes (PSO), and course outcomes (CO) that help us to gain feedback on students' progress. These learning assessments include informal, non- graded strategies such as classroom assessment techniques and formal assessment of students' success in achieving course objectives and learning outcomes. Learning outcomes are discussed within the context of programme assessment and components of any class with a view to sharpen the focus on student learning. The outcomes to be realised by the students are communicated to them in advance to ensure that POs, PCOs and COs are attained by the students. The curriculum is properly implemented and at the end of the semester, continuous evaluation is made in a time- bound and comprehensive way. The active participation of the learner is ensured in the transaction of the curriculum by involving them in tasks like quizzes, seminars, debates, poster presentations and field trips to present their understanding about the topic.ut the topic.

20.Distance education/online education:

The college has its YouTube channel, a G-Suite account, LMS platform (MOODLE), several official and class Telegram and WhatsApp groups for online teaching and learning. as well as interacting with its stakeholders and obtaining feedback. All faculty have been widely availing these online amenities. The blended mode of instruction has been found highly effective. Online classes by experts/faculty from other colleges have been handled via platforms like Google Meet,

Webex Meet, Zoom Meeting, Live Board, Edmodo and the like. This evolution has led to the emergence of innovative teaching methods, adaptive learning systems, and interactive learning environments, enhancing the overall quality of online education.

Krishna Menon Memorial Govt. Women's College offers various graduate and post graduate programmes under the Outcome Based Education (OBE) and Choice Based Credit Semester System(CBCSS). The college is affiliated to Kannur University and adheres to the general curricular framework and academic calendar prescribed by the university. As part of offering new generation courses, the college has been offering an M.Sc course in Chemistry with specialisation in Drug Chemistry. The PG Department of English has been recognized as a Research Centre.

The IQAC serves as a monitoring and documenting mechanism that ensures the timely and qualitative delivery of the curriculum. Under the aegis of the IQAC, workshops and seminars are conducted wherein eminent scholars share their views and experience. The college has a

well-functioning library with over 48,000 books along with journals. The teachers adopt blended learning strategies incorporating Learning Management System (MOODLE), YouTube lectures, films etc.

Based on the feedback obtained, the limitations of the curriculum and the problems in its implementation are duly informed to the University through the concerned BoS and Academic Council members of the college.

Recognizing the imperative need for environmental protection and sustainable development, the curriculum includes diverse courses

such as Readings on Life and Nature, Paristithi-Dalit-Lingapadavi, Environmental Economics, Environmental Studies, and Environmental History. These courses equip students with the knowledge to conserve, and actively participate in environmental management and disaster mitigation arising from planetary changes.

Moreover, the curriculum places a strong emphasis on human values and ethics, offering courses such as Readings on Democracy and Secularism, Readings on Philosophy of Knowledge, and History of Human Rights. These courses engage students in profound discussions on sovereignty, socialism, secularism, and democracy within the Indian context. The readings in these courses highlight the crucial connection between higher education and constitutional directives.

The college implements tailored strategies to address the diverse learning needs of both advanced and slow learners. Through meticulous assessment of strengths and weaknesses, the institution ensures comprehensive student development.

Identifying learners' capabilities begins during admissions, enabling departments to gauge individual aptitudes. Ongoing evaluation via internal and external assessments, seminar participation, and engagement in curricular and co-curricular activities continually assess students' progress.

For advanced learners, initiatives of the Career guidance and Placement Cell in the college offers mentorship and motivation sessions. Their prospects for betterment are also obtained through the field visits to esteemed educational institutions. They receive guidance for competitive exams, participate in seminars, and access coaching for civil service exams. Programs like the Additional Skill

Acquisition Programme and Young Innovators Programme further enrich their skill sets.

Conversely, measures for slow learners include the Remedial teaching, providing mentorship and additional classes to bolster academic performance. Peer learning, bridge courses, and counseling services aim to narrow the learning gap. through the Tutorial system weake students are provided additional classes and their progress is monitored. The 'Know Your Student" programme for First degree students has enabled faculty to understand the background of the students which has to an extent facilitated in giving them support in academics. Comprehensive question banks and model papers aid both groups in their academic pursuits, fostering a conducive learning environment.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The students of the college are continuously assessed through a well established and faultless method as per the directions by Kannur University. For undergraduate programmes, out of 50 marks in their written examination, 10 marks are given for internal assessment or continuous evaluation (CE) on a four-criteria base. They are students' attendance in classes (2.5 marks), assignment (2.5 marks), seminar presentation (2.5 marks) and test paper (2.5 marks). For postgraduate programmes, out of 100 marks 20 marks are allotted for internal assessment which comprises of attendance (5 marks), assignments (5 marks), seminar presentations (5 marks) and test papers (5 marks). The End Semester Examination is conducted at the end of each semester -April/May for even semesters and October/November for the odd semesters.

Apart from the university mode of internal assessment, each department follows several academically oriented methodologies to assess the students' academic competence and scholarly output.

They include:

- Peer assessment in which the task assessment is given to their classmates
- Unit tests after each module has been taught
- Seminar presentations/Viva-voce
- Summative or end semester departmental tests with the assistance of PTA: assessments to evaluate student learning, knowledge, proficiency, or success at the conclusion of an instructional period, like a unit, course, or programme.
- Individual/group discussions and deliberations

Internal assessment fosters continuous learning, providing feedback, identifying strengths, and pinpointing areas for improvement.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The college's Grievance Redressal Cell aims to promptly resolve exam-related issues, fostering accountability and responsiveness among faculty and students. The three layers of grievance redressal are:

At the Department level: The students can approach concerned course teacher with their grievances. Further, they can approach the department grievance cell (DGC) comprising of the Head (chairperson), Course Teacher and senior teacher.

At the College level: The college level Grievance Redressal Committee (CGRC) consists of the Principal (Chairperson), Staff Advisor (Convenor), chairman and General Secretary of the college union, two senior teachers and two elected members to the staff council.

At the University level: The Grievance Redressal Committee under the chairmanship of Pro-Vice Chancellor, and Director, SDE as convenor with Convenors of Standing Committees of the Syndicate on Examinations, and Student Welfare, Controller of Examinations, Director of Student Services and University Union Chairperson as members consider the complaints/appeals from students with regard to internal and external evaluation. The research scholars can lodge their grievances directly to the Director, Directorate of Research, Kannur University.

Procedure for Registering Complaint: The complaints/anxieties lodged by the students are promptly attended to on the receipt of written grievances from the students. The cell formally reviews all cases and gives a report on the cases attended to and the number of pending cases which require direction and guidance from the higher authorities.

The college offers a comprehensive range of 399 courses across undergraduate and postgraduate programs, supplemented by additional courses within each department's discipline. Aligned with Kannur University's guidelines, faculty members engage in curriculum restructuring workshops, meticulously defining program and course outcomes. Departmental coordinators, along with a CBCSS-OBE Coordinator, elucidate these outcomes to students at semester onset, and syllabi with outcomes are distributed and accessible on the college website.

The curriculum is crafted to instill awareness of environmental concerns, sustainable development, gender issues, and human values. Every course aims to impart foundational subject knowledge, foster analytical prowess, nurture research skills, and cultivate employability awareness. Graduate programs strive for holistic student development, emphasizing these attributes upon program completion.

General courses, including English and various languages, concentrate on enhancing communicative skills, intellectual depth, and appreciation for diverse literature. Undergraduate core courses target specialized field outcomes and research, while postgraduate core courses emphasize analytical and research proficiencies in specialized areas. Open/Generic courses encourage interdisciplinary exploration.

The college enjoys autonomy in designing add-on course outcomes, offering vocational training with prior communication to students. Overall, the curriculum aims to equip students with diverse skill sets and a comprehensive worldview for their future endeavours.

2.6.2 - Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

The college has moved to Outcome Based Education (OBE) implemented by the Kannur University since 2019 for all the undergraduate programmes. The first batch of students have passed out completing the newly introduced OBE programmes. Hence, assessment of the programme specific outcome is yet to be arrived at. Meanwhile, the college has mechanisms to assess the programme outcome achieved by the students who had completed the programme under object based mode of education. It was done through periodic internal and external examinations, assignment writings, and seminar presentations.

Since 2019, the college embraced Outcome Based Education (OBE) mandated by Kannur University for undergrad programs. The inaugural batch under OBE has graduated, awaiting specific outcome evaluations. However, the college gauges the program outcomes for students educated through the previous model. Regular assessments via internal and external exams, assignments, and seminars determine these outcomes.

The university and college collaborate to assess course-specific outcomes for ongoing undergraduates in the OBE framework. Students receive detailed outcomes before each course, aligning lectures and activities accordingly. Assignments, presentations, quizzes, book reviews, and creative projects evaluate progress. Module completion prompts internal and external exams tailored to test attainment of these outcomes.

Postgraduate programs are pending OBE integration; preparations are underway. Existing programs continually assess course and program objectives to ensure student achievement.

The institution's faculty-designed add-on courses exhibit well-defined and mostly achieved outcomes. Evaluation shows students mastering their trained field, affirming the effectiveness of these additional programs.

The available infrastructure and institutional setup have rationally been appropriated to this end. The IQAC encourages its entire faculty to engage in research leading towards innovative knowledge creation. In addition, they are encouraged to publish their findings in academic and popular journals of repute. The IQAC periodically conducts seminars and conferences by inviting original contributors in diverse fields of knowledge to sensitize the young faculty members of the college and the nearby colleges on the state of the art knowledge in various disciplines. The IQAC organized computer training programmes for the teaching and non- teaching staff

separately in 2022. The Malayalam department organized talks by eminent personalities. The Political Science department conducted a one day national seminar on democracy.

The annual multidisciplinary indexed and peer-reviewed research journal Convergia (ISSN 2322-0651) of the college was published. The faculty and research scholars of the college contribute their research findings in the journal along with reviewed articles by scholars from within the country and abroad.

The college has a Research Promotion Forum that strives to bridge the gap between learning and research-related activities. It holds its fortnightly meetings-Vyazhavattam to discuss field experiences, theoretical concerns and methodological issues. The English Research department conducted a series of lecture presentations by research scholars on prison narratives, resistance and culture and mythological narratives.

3.4 - Extension Activities

3.4.1 - Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the year

The success of the two previous projects in 2018 & 2021 and the demand from the beneficiaries motivated the NSS to take up another project. Advertisements are made through local dailies in order to find the beneficiaries. A total of thirty seven beneficiaries were identified, sixteen artificial limbs, twenty calliper, one artificial hand were distributed. The prosthesis camp was inaugurated on 10th March 2023 by MP Dr V. Shivadasan. The total expense of this project was Rs 400000/-. The distribution was done on 3rd May 2023 in a function inaugurated by Minister Dr. R Bindu.

The celebration of Independence day by the students was with the inmates of Amala Bavan Old Age Home. An entire day was spent in singing, dancing, having food and sharing time with the inmates. The volunteers procured sanitary items worth 10000/- which was handed over to the home.

The NSS unit and Palliative care unit of Kottali Health Sub Centre conducted a 'Snehasangamam' of the families of cancer affected patients. 25 such families have participated in the programme on 24th September 2022. The District Panchayat president Smt. P P Divya inaugurated the function. The NSS Unit distributed onakkodi (new dress for the upcoming onam celebrations). World Palliative Day and World Mental Health day was celebrated by NSS unit jointly with Palliative care initiative in Kannur (PIK).

The college involved in various campaigns for spreading awareness in the society of the impending dangers of the excessive and indiscriminate use of plastic, e-waste, and drug use etc.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college's strategic location near National Highway 66 ensures convenient access for all stakeholders. The campus upholds sustainability through its lush green cover and ancient tree canopies.

Featuring 35 well-equipped classrooms, 24 cater to undergraduate programmes, six for postgraduate studies, and one for research scholars. Four additional classrooms are reserved for forthcoming courses. Among these, 13 have LCD projectors, 19 are equipped with interactive whiteboards, while eight large rooms offer lecterns with built-in amplifiers and other amenities.

Two seminar halls and an IQAC room, equipped with essential facilities including LCD projectors, complement the campus's infrastructure. The college has a burgeoning Central Library housing 48,276 books, 16 journals, 24 magazines, 6275 e-journals, e-books, and access to INFLIBNET-N-List.

Comprehensive laboratory facilities support the science students. The Chemistry department features laboratories aiding computer-aided drug design, equipped with essential instruments like UV-visible spectrophotometers. The Physics laboratory accommodates 40 students and is well-equipped for physics experiments.

Additionally, computer science labs and specialized facilities like ASAP and ORICE studio cater to diverse learning needs. The college has a Moodle LMS to facilitate blended learning for students.

The college prioritises student welfare by providing subsidised books and stationery through a cooperative store and affordable meals via the Kudumbasree-run canteen.

Students at the college showcase exceptional skill in cultural events and sports across various levels—university, state, national, and international. The institution boasts of accomplished singers, classical dancers, cine-artists, and internationally acclaimed sports achievers.

Facilities geared towards cultural activities include a 1000-seat

auditorium with sound and lighting systems, complemented by two seminar halls and an open-air stage for diverse performances. Student-led organizations like the College Students Union, Fine Arts Club, departmental associations, and specialized clubs organise a spectrum of literary and cultural events. The Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) financially supports student training endeavours.

For sports enthusiasts, the college offers an Indoor Stadium for basketball, volleyball, and badminton training, alongside a separate outdoor basketball court and volleyball court. A well-equipped gymnasium caters to both faculty and students, with provisions for differently-abled individuals.

The college's vast open ground facilitates football and other outdoor games, including archery training extended to students from neighbouring schools and colleges. It also functions as a venue for various University sports meets. The hostel accommodates and encourages students from distant places under sports quotas.

Regular yoga sessions utilize the indoor stadium and the courtyard. The Jeevani Center provides health services and counselling, in addition to meditation and stress management.

The library is fully automated using the Open Source Library Integrated System- Koha and the latest version of 20.10 is being used. Dewey Decimal Classification system is used to classify books. Anglo American Cataloguing Rules II is used for thepreparation of the library catalogue. Online Public Access Catalogue is available for search which facilitates members of the library to access information on the availability of books and due date,. Multiple node OPAC facility ensures productive time management. The links for freee-resource,Shodhganga,NDLTD, Kerala Sahitya Academy and other online learning platforms are listed in the website.

Previous question papers are available for reference purposes. A barcode is implemented for issue and return of books. The library is equipped with four computers including one server system, printer, photocopy machine and bar code printer. It has an e-resource corner with two computers to access online resources. It functions on all working days from 9.00 a.m. to 5p.m.

Wired Internet facility is made available in the whole campus. All computers in the departments, class rooms, computer lab, office, library and hostel are connected through LAN using optical fibre connectivity among the blocks.

ICT enabled classrooms are equipped with networked desktop computer, smartboard, projector, lectern and UPS. All departments are provided with desktop computers with internet access and printer.

Computer laboratories are equipped with desktop computers with the latest configuration and software as per requirements of the curriculum. The college library is fully automated and students can access online resources. The college website is maintained and upgraded regularly.

An installation of the latest version of Moodle learning management system is currently being used as the college LMS. All students and teachers are enrolled in the LMS and the course materials are made available to students. Currently, there are more than 100 courses in college LMS.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The college has comprehensive physical, academic, and support facilities, adhering to government regulations for their maintenance and usage. It follows strict purchase procedures ensuring asset quality and often opts for Annual Maintenance Contracts for durable items.

State funds, both plan and non-plan, aid in maintaining infrastructure. During the financial year 2022-23 an amount of Rs 1325680/- was received as Plan Fund in the college. While the Plan Fund is for the maintenance of laboratories and library, the Non-Plan Fund caters to physical structures. These funds are managed by the PWD which is responsible for the construction, oversight and maintenance of physical facilities. Additionally, the college receives aid from various sources like the College Development Council (CDC), Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), and Personal Development account (PDA). These funds aid in repairs, maintenance, and even beautification.

Committees oversee maintenance, conduct regular inspections, and manage stock verification for libraries, electrical equipment, and other assets. Students and faculty contribute to campus upkeep through allocated cleaning hours and orientation programmes for new students.

Solid and e-waste management is efficiently handled, emphasizing clean and plastic-free spaces. The 'Haritha Keralam Mission' aids in waste management. Water supply is sustained by wells, and the college has an Eco-park and also a "Vidya Vanam" (Forest of Knowledge) maintained by the Forest Department of Kerala, which has rare species of plants.

Various committees ensure efficient asset utilisation, allocate spaces, manage library resources, supervise the cooperative store and canteen, and encourage community use of facilities like the auditorium and stadium.

As a DCE-owned institution, the college primarily relies on the Government of Kerala for financial and administrative backing. Supplementary support streams from UGC, RUSA, PTA, and Alumni contributions, managed by clerical staff overseeing major funds. The Head Accountant ensures precise financial management, lauded by external audit teams for impeccable practices.

Both internal and external audits are regularly conducted. The Audit Committee conducts internal audits, while three entities-Office of the Accountant General, independent Chartered Accountants, and Directorate of Collegiate Education-perform external audits.

DCE conducts routine audits, deploying specialized officers to scrutinize various funds and documents, including plan funds, RUSA funds, bills, library records, scholarships, and more. The Office of the Accountant General primarily scrutinizes state government non-plan funds and related aspects.

External Chartered Accountants oversee stakeholder funds like PTA and Alumni contributions, validating expenditure and bills from central government grants. Audits undergo stakeholder scrutiny for accountability, with reports routinely submitted to funding agencies like RUSA and UGC.

An internal audit committee comprising department members regularly assesses fund usage and suggests improvements. This committee also conducts annual asset stock audits for each department. Their findings are presented to the College Council, guiding further enhancements in accounting practices, emphasizing responsible utilization of resources.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

The college is in the government sector and a major part of the financial resources are received in the form of plan and non-plan assistance from the government of Kerala. Other sources included the RUSA, PTA, CDC, and Alumni. The Directorate of Collegiate Education allocates various plan and non-plan funds upon the approval of the proposals submitted by the institution. Funds are disbursed for purposes like faculty development programmes, infrastructure, field trips and study tours, construction and maintenance. A total of Rs. 13,25680 was sanctioned as plan fund assistance during 2022-23.

The CDCfund is collected from the students and remitted to the government. on its receipt, the government contributes a matching grant and restores the fund to the college. A total of Rs. 6,27600 has been spent on infrastructure.

The college welcomes voluntary contribution from students as PTA fund at the time of admission. The fund thus collected is used for developmental and maintenance activities of the college. PTA spent a total of Rs.5,79,415 during 2022-23 for the overall development and

maintenance in the college.

The College Council is the authority for sanctioning government funds which is made only on the basis of prior submission of the proposals by the departments and library. The CDC fund is passed by the CDC chaired by the District Collector. The executive committee of the PTA decides on the PTA fund allocation for various purposes. The internal and external audit mechanism of the college ensures efficient utilisation of the financial resources available.

The IQAC of the college has initiated several practices for inspiring the stakeholders to undertake strategies to deliver quality higher education. The first is the willing acceptance of the faculty and students to move to ICT enabled education. In 2021, the college has been provided with LMS server and space by the DCE since all faculty of the college have completed MOODLE training. This year IQAC organised a two week online moodle traqining programme for the faculty of the college-Moodle LMS Essential Training for Teachers(04-7-2022 to 17-7-2022) and Empower Your Computer skills(03-08-2022 & 04-08-2022) for the non teaching staff of the college

Another important project of the IQAC is the conservation of the rich biodiversity in the campus. The constant move to green the campus and conserve the bio-diversity park and Vidyavanam has been widely received. The college has made an agreement with a trust to collect electronic and degradable wastes and an effective solid waste management . The campus has been declared a 'Green Campus' and has been recognized as the model campus to propagate the idea among other colleges and educational institutions of the neighbourhood.

The Haritha Keralam Mission of the State government provides all technical support for the IQAC initiatives. The Nature club, Forestry club and EWYL programme also assists the IQAC in this venture.

The IQAC implements methods for periodical review and documentation of incremental improvement in the quality of teaching-learning. The IQAC ensures the proper functioning of the Academic Monitoring Committee which actively engages and monitors the preparation of the timetable, organization of industry and employability linked special lectures, conduct of model examinations, and provides special assistance to the students of differently abled and those have learning disabilities. The IQAC prepares a master time table and all the departments adhere to it. The teachers submit their teacher's diary to IQAC as and when required and the process helps for a constant monitoring of syllabus coverage.

The postgraduate departments of the college are instructed to conduct special lectures of experts from various industries and firms to improve the employability of the students and motivate them to establish start-ups.

The faculty of of the college are instructed to submit their Self-Appraisal Reports every year which is meant for considering their placements and promotions self-reflexive of their academic performance, including teaching-learning and research activities.

In addition, to the periodic internal academic auditing done by the IQAC, all the teaching departments of the college are asked to undergo an annual external academic audit. The external academic audit report done at the Department of Physics and Economics during the last academic year had suggested that it should be uplifted as a research department. The IQAC seriously considered the matter and the department is provided with documentation support to apply to Kannur University in this regard.

The college upholds the values of gender equity. It has incorporated themes and issues related to gender sensitivity and equity within the curricula and the same is imparted through common courses and complimentary courses of both UG and PG programmes. They include 'Readings on Gender' , "Alternative Economics", "Heterodox Economics", "Gender and Society in India", and "Gender in Indian History" and Gender theory and Womens Writing.

The college provides a conducive environment for students on gender equity through a set of well-sequenced programmes. The Women Cell in association with Kannur Thaluk Legal Service Committee conducted a session on the legal problems faced by women in the society and the protection laws. Sessions on Zero Menstrual Waste, Breast Cancer as well as a Gender Awareness Campaign and Skill Development Training in collaboration with the KSWDC was conducted. Women's Fest marked a week-long celebration with talks, performances and competitions. On International Women's day 2023, the college in association with Kannur Town Janamaitri Police Station organised a Self Defence Training programme.

The college has a counselling centre-Jeevani Centre, for the well being of students. The centre also conducts orientation classes, group counselling, mental health day celebrations, and invited talks on special themes. The faculty of the college are encouraged to attend FDP programmes on gender studies and also engage in research related to gender issues.

Towards zero waste generation is the slogan adopted by the college. To ensure that the campus is litter-free, the college associates with the Superintendent-Gate Initiative programme of the Central Prison, Kannur. The inmates and officials of the Central Prison along with students and teachers of the college conduct an annual cleaning drive. As part of the Kerala Haritha Mission and Kudumbasree initiatives of the Govt. of Kerala periodical visits are made to the college to collect solid waste. A well-maintained incinerator and six sanitary-napkin incinerator units are installed at different points in the campus

The college has installed multiple facilities to process degradable wastes. There are two biogas plants- one is connected to the canteen kitchen and the other with the kitchen of the women's hostel. The college has installed pipe-composting units to decompose degradable wastes to be used as manure.

The college collaborates with Chalode Plastic Recycling Unit, Kannur to collect plastic and other recyclable wastes. The college encourages its departments to buy devices of multiple functions to scale down the accumulation of e-waste.

Being a green campus, the possibility of lodgment of liquid waste is very limited. In case of any possibility, the college had a proper drainage system to manage liquid wastes connected with the Kannur Municipal Corporation. Each washroom is linked with a three-chambered septic tank-system. Solvents from the chemistry laboratories are distilled and reused. The drainage from the lab is connected to a closed pit filled with pebbles, charcoal and lime.

The college is a most preferred institution in north Malabar by students from religious minorities like Muslims and Christians and socio-economic minorities like Scheduled tribals. The college insists and ensures that the value of egalitarianism is upheld within the campus. The students attend the college in uniform and

the same is supplied either free or on subsidized rate from the college cooperative store. The preference for the uniform and students' compliance to it distances the possibility of expressing any kind of hierarchy within the campus.

Of the total number of students, 35 per cent belongs to religious minority groups. Every year festivals like Christmas, Ramadan, and Onam are celebrated with the total participation of the students. These occasions are converted as moments to share the idea of religious harmony and equality. Adding flavour to these occasions, there are student-teacher organized communal feasts as well. To reduce the drop- out rate among the religious minority groups, they are awarded scholarships and other remedial means.

Nearly 15 per cent of the students belong to the socio-economical and culturally disadvantaged scheduled caste and scheduled tribe sections. The college is preferred by students belonging to scheduled tribes from far places like Wayanad and Kasaragod. Preference is given to them for hostel accommodation and college ensures their scholarships too.

The Equal Opportunity Cell and the Minority Cell helps to keep the college inclusive. The Department of Sanskrit and the Department of Arabic stand for promoting interests of the linguistic minorities.

The college boasts of a rich and illustrious green campus which is unique among other institutions of higher education in Malabar region. It maintains an eco-park which hosts quite a number of

wildlife, medicinal plants, creepers, traditional trees like mango trees, jackfruit trees, and coconut palms.. The site is spread across an area of 15 acres which performs as the lungs of the city of Kannur. 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The students of the college are continuously assessed through a well established and faultless method as per the directions by Kannur University. For undergraduate programmes, out of 50 marks in their written examination, 10 marks are given for internal assessment or continuous evaluation (CE) on a four-criteria base. They are students' attendance in classes (2.5 marks), assignment (2.5 marks), seminar presentation (2.5 marks) and test paper (2.5 marks). For postgraduate programmes, out of 100 marks 20 marks are allotted for internal assessment which comprises of attendance (5 marks), assignments (5 marks), seminar

presentations (5 marks) and test papers (5 marks). The End Semester Examination is conducted at the end of each semester -April/May for even semesters and October/ November for the odd semesters.

Apart from the university mode of internal assessment, each department follows several academically oriented methodologies to assess the students' academic competence and scholarly output.

They include:

- Peer assessment in which the task assessment is given to their classmates
- Unit tests after each module has been taught
- Seminar presentations/Viva-voce
- Summative or end semester departmental tests with the assistance of PTA: assessments to evaluate student learning, knowledge, proficiency, or success at the conclusion of an instructional period, like a unit, course, or programme.
- Individual/group discussions and deliberations

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The college's Grievance Redressal Cell aims to promptly resolve exam-related issues, fostering accountability and responsiveness among faculty and students. The three layers of grievance redressal are:

At the Department level: The students can approach concerned course teacher with their grievances. Further, they can approach the department grievance cell (DGC) comprising of the Head (chairperson), Course Teacher and senior teacher.

At the College level: The college level Grievance Redressal Committee (CGRC) consists of the Principal (Chairperson), Staff Advisor (Convenor), chairman and General Secretary of the college union, two senior teachers and two elected members to the staff council.

At the University level: The Grievance Redressal Committee under the chairmanship of Pro-Vice Chancellor, and Director, SDE as convenor with Convenors of Standing Committees of the Syndicate on Examinations, and Student Welfare, Controller of Examinations, Director of Student Services and University Union Chairperson as members consider the complaints/appeals from students with regard to internal and external evaluation. The research scholars can lodge their grievances directly to the Director, Directorate of Research, Kannur University.

Procedure for Registering Complaint: The complaints/anxieties lodged by the students are promptly attended to on the receipt of written grievances from the students. Aligned with Kannur University's guidelines, faculty members engage in curriculum restructuring workshops, meticulously defining program and course outcomes. Departmental coordinators, along with a CBCSS-OBE Coordinator, elucidate these outcomes to students at semester onset, and syllabi with outcomes are distributed and accessible on the college website.

The curriculum is crafted to instill awareness of environmental concerns, sustainable development, gender issues, and human values. Every course aims to impart foundational subject knowledge, foster analytical prowess, nurture research skills, and cultivate employability awareness. Graduate programs strive for holistic student development, emphasizing these attributes upon program completion.

General courses, including English and various languages, concentrate on enhancing communicative skills, intellectual depth, and appreciation for diverse literature. Undergraduate core courses target specialized field outcomes and research, while postgraduate core courses emphasize analytical and research proficiencies in specialized areas. Open/Generic courses encourage interdisciplinary exploration.

The college enjoys autonomy in designing add-on course outcomes, offering vocational training with prior communication to students. Overall, the curriculum aims to equip students with diverse skill sets and a comprehensive worldview for their future endeavours.

2.6.2 - Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

The college has moved to Outcome Based Education (OBE) implemented by the Kannur University since 2019 for all the undergraduate programmes. The first batch of students have passed out completing the newly introduced OBE programmes. Hence, assessment of the programme specific outcome is yet to be arrived at. Meanwhile, the college has mechanisms to assess the programme outcome achieved by the students who had completed the programme under object based mode of education. It was done through periodic internal and external examinations, assignment writings, and seminar presentations.

Since 2019, the college embraced Outcome Based Education (OBE) mandated by Kannur University for undergrad programs. The inaugural batch under OBE has graduated, awaiting specific outcome evaluations. However, the college gauges the program outcomes for students educated through the previous model. Regular assessments via internal and external exams, assignments, and seminars determine these outcomes.

The university and college collaborate to assess course-specific outcomes for ongoing undergraduates in the OBE framework. Students receive detailed outcomes before each course, aligning lectures and activities accordingly. Assignments, presentations, quizzes, book reviews, and creative projects evaluate progress. Module completion prompts internal and external exams tailored to test attainment of these outcomes.

Postgraduate programs are pending OBE integration; preparations are underway. Existing programs continually assess course and program objectives to ensure student achievement.

The institution's faculty-designed add-on courses exhibit well-defined and mostly achieved outcomes. Evaluation shows students mastering their trained field, affirming the effectiveness of these additional programs.

3.4 - Extension Activities

3.4.1 - Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the year

The success of the two previous projects in 2018 & 2021 and the demand from the beneficiaries motivated the NSS to take up

another project. Advertisements are made through local dailies in order to find the beneficiaries. A total of thirty seven beneficiaries were identified, sixteen artificial limbs, twenty calliper, one artificial hand were distributed. The prosthesis camp was inaugurated on 10th March 2023 by MP Dr V. Shivadasan. The total expense of this project was Rs 400000/-. The distribution was done on 3rd May 2023 in a function inaugurated by Minister Dr. R Bindu.

The celebration of Independence day by the students was with the inmates of Amala Bavan Old Age Home. An entire day was spent in singing , dancing, having food and sharing time with the inmates. The volunteers procured sanitary items worth 10000/- which was handed over to the home.

The NSS unit and Palliative care unit of Kottali Health Sub Centre conducted a 'Snehasangamam' of the families of cancer affected patients. 25 such families have participated in the programme on 24th September 2022. The District Panchayat president Smt.P P Divya inaugurated the function. The NSS Unit distributed onakkodi (new dress for the upcoming onam celebrations). World Palliative Day and World Mental Health day was celebrated by NSS unit jointly with Palliative care initiative in Kannur (PIK).

The college involved in various campaigns for spreading awareness in the society of the impending dangers of the excessive and indiscriminate use of plastic, e-waste, and drug use etc.

The college's strategic location near National Highway 66 ensures convenient access for all stakeholders. The campus upholds sustainability through its lush green cover and ancient tree	

canopies.

Featuring 35 well-equipped classrooms, 24 cater to undergraduate programmes, six for postgraduate studies, and one for research scholars. Four additional classrooms are reserved for forthcoming courses. Among these, 13 have LCD projectors, 19 are equipped with interactive whiteboards, while eight large rooms offer lecterns with built-in amplifiers and other amenities.

Two seminar halls and an IQAC room, equipped with essential facilities including LCD projectors, complement the campus's infrastructure. The college has a burgeoning Central Library housing 48,276 books, 16 journals, 24 magazines, 6275 e-journals, e-books, and access to INFLIBNET-N-List.

Comprehensive laboratory facilities support the science students. The Chemistry department features laboratories aiding computer-aided drug design, equipped with essential instruments like UV-visible spectrophotometers. The Physics laboratory accommodates 40 students and is well-equipped for physics experiments.

Additionally, computer science labs and specialized facilities like ASAP and ORICE studio cater to diverse learning needs. The college has a Moodle LMS to facilitate blended learning for students.

The college prioritises student welfare by providing subsidised books and stationery through a cooperative store and affordable meals via the Kudumbasree-run canteen.

Facilities geared towards cultural activities include a 1000-seat auditorium with sound and lighting systems, complemented by two seminar halls and an open-air stage for diverse performances. Student-led organizations like the College Students Union, Fine Arts Club, departmental associations, and specialized clubs organise a spectrum of literary and cultural events. The Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) financially supports student training endeavours.

For sports enthusiasts, the college offers an Indoor Stadium for basketball, volleyball, and badminton training, alongside a separate outdoor basketball court and volleyball court. A well-equipped gymnasium caters to both faculty and students, with provisions for differently-abled individuals.

The college's vast open ground facilitates football and other outdoor games, including archery training extended to students from neighbouring schools and colleges. It also functions as a venue for various University sports meets. The hostel accommodates and encourages students from distant places under sports quotas.

Regular yoga sessions utilize the indoor stadium and the courtyard. The Jeevani Center provides health services and counselling, in addition to meditation and stress management.

An installation of the latest version of Moodle learning management system is currently being used as the college LMS. All students and teachers are enrolled in the LMS and the course materials are made available to students. Currently, there are more than 100 courses in college LMS.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The college has comprehensive physical, academic, and support facilities, adhering to government regulations for their maintenance and usage. It follows strict purchase procedures ensuring asset quality and often opts for Annual Maintenance Contracts for durable items.

State funds, both plan and non-plan, aid in maintaining infrastructure. During the financial year 2022-23 an amount of Rs 1325680/- was received as Plan Fund in the college. While the Plan Fund is for the maintenance of laboratories and library, the Non-Plan Fund caters to physical structures. These funds are managed by the PWD which is responsible for the construction, oversight and maintenance of physical facilities. Additionally, the college receives aid from various sources like the College Development Council (CDC), Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), and Personal Development account (PDA). These funds aid in repairs, maintenance, and even beautification.

Committees oversee maintenance, conduct regular inspections, and manage stock verification for libraries, electrical equipment, and other assets. Students and faculty contribute to campus upkeep through allocated cleaning hours and orientation programmes for new students.

Solid and e-waste management is efficiently handled, emphasizing clean and plastic-free spaces. The 'Haritha Keralam Mission' aids in waste management. Water supply is sustained by wells, and the college has an Eco-park and also a "Vidya Vanam" (Forest of

Knowledge) maintained by the Forest Department of Kerala, which has rare species of plants.

Various committees ensure efficient asset utilisation, allocate spaces, manage library resources, supervise the cooperative store and canteen, and encourage community use of facilities like the auditorium and stadium.

The PBAS helps identify the potential area of the faculty. Every year external subject experts conduct department-level academic audits. The Academic Monitoring Committee and IQAC consolidates these reports and the Principal then offers constructive suggestions.

As a DCE-owned institution, the college primarily relies on the Government of Kerala for financial and administrative backing. Supplementary support streams from UGC, RUSA, PTA, and Alumni contributions, managed by clerical staff overseeing major funds. The Head Accountant ensures precise financial management, lauded by external audit teams for impeccable practices.

Both internal and external audits are regularly conducted. The Audit Committee conducts internal audits, while three entities- Office of the Accountant General, independent Chartered Accountants, and Directorate of Collegiate Education-perform

external audits.

DCE conducts routine audits, deploying specialized officers to scrutinize various funds and documents, including plan funds, RUSA funds, bills, library records, scholarships, and more. The Office of the Accountant General primarily scrutinizes state government non-plan funds and related aspects.

External Chartered Accountants oversee stakeholder funds like PTA and Alumni contributions, validating expenditure and bills from central government grants. Audits undergo stakeholder scrutiny for accountability, with reports routinely submitted to funding agencies like RUSA and UGC.

An internal audit committee comprising department members regularly assesses fund usage and suggests improvements. This committee also conducts annual asset stock audits for each department. Their findings are presented to the College Council, guiding further enhancements in accounting practices, emphasizing responsible utilization of resources.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

The college is in the government sector and a major part of the financial resources are received in the form of plan and non-plan assistance from the government of Kerala. Other sources included the RUSA, PTA, CDC, and Alumni. The Directorate of Collegiate Education allocates various plan and non-plan funds upon the approval of the proposals submitted by the institution. Funds are disbursed for purposes like faculty development programmes, infrastructure, field trips and study tours, construction and maintenance. A total of Rs. 13,25680 was sanctioned as plan fund assistance during 2022-23.

The CDC fund is collected from the students and remitted to the government. on its receipt, the government contributes a matching grant and restores the fund to the college. A total of Rs. 6,27600 has been spent on infrastructure.

The college welcomes voluntary contribution from students as PTA fund at the time of admission. The fund thus collected is used for developmental and maintenance activities of the college. PTA spent a total of Rs.5,79,415 during 2022-23 for the overall development and maintenance in the college.

The College Council is the authority for sanctioning government funds which is made only on the basis of prior submission of the proposals by the departments and library. The CDC fund is passed by the CDC chaired by the District Collector. The executive committee of the PTA decides on the PTA fund allocation for various purposes. The internal and external audit mechanism of the college ensures efficient utilisation of the financial resources available.

The IQAC of the college has initiated several practices for inspiring the stakeholders to undertake strategies to deliver quality higher education. The first is the willing acceptance of the faculty and students to move to ICT enabled education. In 2021, the college has been provided with LMS server and space by the DCE since all faculty of the college have completed MOODLE training. This year IQAC organised a two week online moodle traqining programme for the faculty of the college-Moodle LMS Essential Training for Teachers(04-7-2022 to 17-7-2022) and Empower Your Computer skills(03-08-2022 & 04-08-2022) for the non teaching staff of the college

Another important project of the IQAC is the conservation of the rich biodiversity in the campus. The constant move to green the campus and conserve the bio-diversity park and Vidyavanam has been widely received. The college has made an agreement with a trust to collect electronic and degradable wastes and an effective solid waste management . The campus has been declared a 'Green Campus' and has been recognized as the model campus to propagate the idea among other colleges and educational institutions of the neighbourhood. The Haritha Keralam Mission of the State government provides all technical support for the IQAC initiatives. The Nature club, Forestry club and EWYL programme also assists the IQAC in this venture.

The IQAC ensures the proper functioning of the Academic Monitoring Committee which actively engages and monitors the preparation of the timetable, organization of industry and employability linked special lectures, conduct of model examinations, and provides special assistance to the students of

differently abled and those have learning disabilities. The IQAC prepares a master time table and all the departments adhere to it. The teachers submit their teacher's diary to IQAC as and when required and the process helps for a constant monitoring of syllabus coverage.

The postgraduate departments of the college are instructed to conduct special lectures of experts from various industries and firms to improve the employability of the students and motivate them to establish start-ups.

The faculty of of the college are instructed to submit their Self-Appraisal Reports every year which is meant for considering their placements and promotions self-reflexive of their academic performance, including teaching-learning and research activities.

In addition, to the periodic internal academic auditing done by the IQAC, all the teaching departments of the college are asked to undergo an annual external academic audit. The external academic audit report done at the Department of Physics and Economics during the last academic year had suggested that it should be uplifted as a research department. The IQAC seriously considered the matter and the department is provided with documentation support to apply to Kannur University in this regard.

7.1.1 - Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the year

The college upholds the values of gender equity. It has incorporated themes and issues related to gender sensitivity and equity within the curricula and the same is imparted through common courses and complimentary courses of both UG and PG programmes. They include 'Readings on Gender' , "Alternative Economics", "Heterodox Economics", "Gender and Society in India", and "Gender in Indian History" and Gender theory and Womens Writing.

The college provides a conducive environment for students on gender equity through a set of well-sequenced programmes. The Women Cell in association with Kannur Thaluk Legal Service Committee conducted a session on the legal problems faced by women in the society and the protection laws. Sessions on Zero Menstrual Waste, Breast Cancer as well as a Gender Awareness Campaign and Skill Development Training in collaboration with the KSWDC was conducted. Women's Fest marked a week-long celebration with talks, performances and competitions. On International Women's day 2023, the college in association with Kannur Town Janamaitri Police Station organised a Self Defence Training programme.

The college has a counselling centre-Jeevani Centre, for the well being of students. The centre also conducts orientation classes, group counselling, mental health day celebrations, and invited talks on special themes. The faculty of the college are encouraged to attend FDP programmes on gender studies and also

Towards zero waste generation is the slogan adopted by the college. To ensure that the campus is litter- free, the college associates with the Superintendent-Gate Initiative programme of the Central Prison, Kannur. The inmates and officials of the Central Prison along with students and teachers of the college conduct an annual cleaning drive .As part of the Kerala Haritha Mission and Kudumbasree initiatives of the Govt. of Kerala periodical visits are made to the college to collect solid waste. A well-maintained incinerator and six sanitary-napkin incinerator units are installed at different points in the campus

The college has installed multiple facilities to process degradable wastes. There are two biogas plants- one is connected

to the canteen kitchen and the other with the kitchen of the womens' hostel. The college has installed pipe-composting units to decompose degradable wastes to be used as manure.

The college collaborates with Chalode Plastic Recycling Unit, Kannur to collect plastic and other recyclable wastes. The college encourages its departments to buy devices of multiple functions to scale down the accumulation of e-waste.

Being a green campus, the possibility of lodgment of liquid waste is very limited. In case of any possibility, the college had a proper drainage system to manage liquid wastes connected with the Kannur Municipal Corporation. Each washroom is linked with a three- chambered septic tank-system. Solvents from the chemistry laboratories are distilled and reused. The drainage from the lab is connected to a closed pit filled with pebbles, charcoal and lime.

7.1.8 - Describe the Institutional efforts/initiatives in providing an inclusive environment i.e., tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal socioeconomic and other diversities (within 200 words).

The college is a most preferred institution in north Malabar by students from religious minorities like Muslims and Christians and socio-economic minorities like Scheduled tribals. The college insists and ensures that the value of egalitarianism is upheld within the campus. The students attend the college in uniform and the same is supplied either free or on subsidized rate from the college cooperative store. The preference for the uniform and students' compliance to it distances the possibility of expressing any kind of hierarchy within the campus.

Of the total number of students, 35 per cent belongs to religious minority groups. Every year festivals like Christmas, Ramadan, and Onam are celebrated with the total participation of the students. These occasions are converted as moments to share the idea of religious harmony and equality. Adding flavour to these occasions, there are student-teacher organized communal feasts as well. To reduce the drop- out rate among the religious minority groups, they are awarded scholarships and other remedial means.

Nearly 15 per cent of the students belong to the socio-economical and culturally disadvantaged scheduled caste and scheduled tribe sections. The college is preferred by students belonging to scheduled tribes from far places like Wayanad and Kasaragod. Preference is given to them for hostel accommodation and college ensures their scholarships too.

The Equal Opportunity Cell and the Minority Cell helps to keep the college inclusive. The Department of Sanskrit and the Department of Arabic stand for promoting interests of the linguistic minorities.

The Department of English offers a common course to all undergraduate students on the constitutional rights of Indian citizens titled "Discoursing Diversities: Reading on Democracy and Secularism". This is an anthology meant to alert the students on the Constitution of India and the concept of democracy and secularism. This book opens with Dr. B.R. Ambedkar's historical speech regarding the constitution. The Political science department is offering a complementary course on "Dynamics of Indian Political System" for undergraduate students, where the key focus is on the provisions of Indian Constitutions. It discusses the preamble, rights, duties and responsibilities of Indian citizens. The college observes the Constitution Day on 26 November.

The college has a Human Rights Club established in 2019 and thereafter talks, essay writing and quiz competitions were regularly conducted on Human Rights and Fundamental rights. A One-day national seminar on "Democracy in India: Issues and Challenges" sponsored by the Institute of Parliamentary Affairs, Government of Kerala was organised on 28 Nov.2022. The Key-Note address was delivered by Dr Arun Kumar K Assistant Professor, Political Science, University of Kerala and journalist. The core argument of his talk was to make an analysis of the concept of constitutional morality.

It maintains an eco-park which hosts quite a number of wildlife, medicinal plants, creepers, traditional trees like mango trees, jackfruit trees, and coconut palms.. The site is spread across an area of 15 acres which performs as the lungs of the city of Kannur. The college upholds the slogan 'Clean Campus Green Campus' which has been widely applauded especially by the Election Commission of Kerala.

The college has been conducting various programmes to keep the campus clean and green. The formation of Green Army is with the intention of maintaining the greenery of the campus, selecting two green volunteers from each class under the guidance of a faculty.
